Our Tenth Annual Thanksgiving Dinner Harvest for Hopelink was a wonderful evening of good food, good spirits and sharing with our neighbors in need.



More than \$2,000 and 134 pounds of food were donated to Hopelink.

Twenty-three volunteers worked 164 hours and we served 101 dinners. With a grant from Thrivent Financial, a contribution from the lodge to cover a few extra food expenses, and the donation of food costs from three of our cooks, we contributed all dinner money collected to Hopelink.

You as members did a great job meeting and exceeding our cash donation challenge, giving a total of \$1,057 — a record of funds collected! With this amount, our total cash donation to Hopelink came to \$2,080. In addition, you brought in 134 pounds of food and other items for the food bank. Hopelink was very grateful for everything they received.

2025 Lutefisk Dinner Was a Success

Thank you to lodge members and others for a successful 2025 Lutefisk and Meatball Dinner. To all that helped and attended, thank you!

I appreciate the efforts of those that worked at the dinner and the prep days leading up to it, and would like to extend my thanks to everyone that attended with your families.

Here is a breakdown of your outstanding activities:

- On the preceeding Thursday, **25 people** worked a total of **129 hours** rolling **250 pounds** of ground beef and all the ingredients into meatballs.
- On the Friday before, **12 people** came and spent a total of **32 hours** to peel and cut **350 pounds** of potatoes.
- Also on the preceeding Friday, **six people** joined our potato peelers to roll silverware and set tables, totaling **28 hours** of volunteer help.
- On Saturday, lodge volunteers cooked up **500 pounds** of Lutefisk and served more than **591 people**.
- All together, we logged more than **752 volunteer hours** in those three days – thank you again.

I'd like to extend a special "thank you" to **Joan Wraalstad** for the countless hours she put in on taking reservations, and then greeting diners with

Bob Schertzel at the cashier table. In addition, "many thanks" to **Mike Nelson** for retrieving all the phone messages and passing them on to Joan, as well as keeping the kitchen moving and on track.

More "special thanks" go to **Diana Hicks** and her team for seating all of our

diners and **Solveig Lindstrom** for managing our dining room and helpers. And "thank you" to **Seth Tufteland** and **Trish Lundeen** for cooking all the fish.

Cost of the dinner was \$40.00 per person and was well worth it for the large crowd that attended. Each year with a few changes we make our dinner a little better. We are fortunate that more and more people are getting the hang of reservations, and most are using email to make them.

Once again, thank you to everyone for a fantastic dinner. We could not do it without each and every one of you. See you next December at the same time on the first Saturday of the month – Dec. 5, 2026.

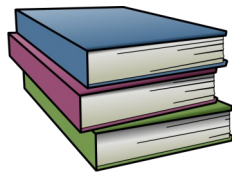

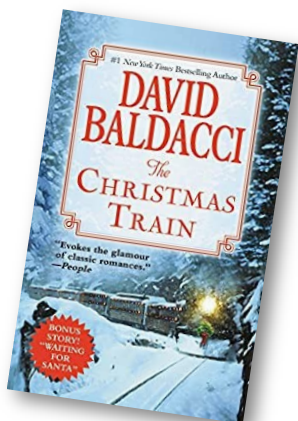

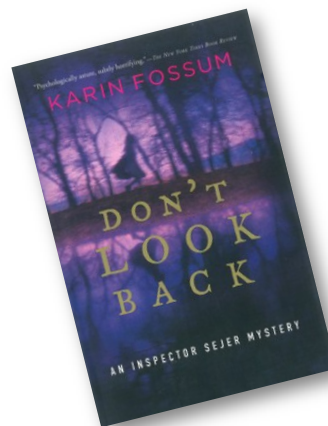

Norwegian writer whose novels are said to be like Nordic Sherlock Holmes stories.

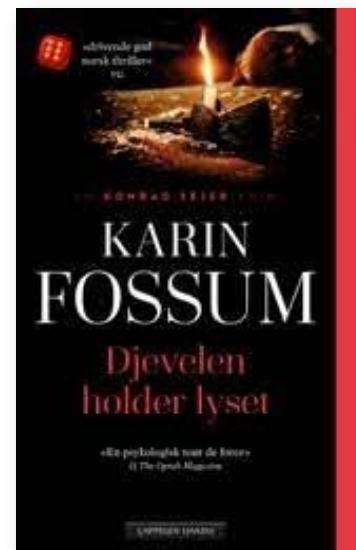


Often called the "Norwegian queen of crime," Fossum debuted as a poet in the mid-seventies and began writing in the

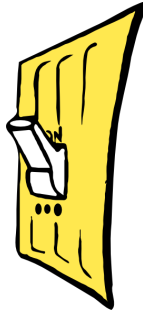

King Harald Opens Sámi Parliament

The 10th Sámi Parliament, held October 15, 2025, in Karasjok, Norway, was opened by a special guest. The King of Norway, His Majesty King Harald, was present to perform the ceremonial opening. Also in attendance was His Royal Highness Crown Prince Haakon.

There was an extensive crowd gathered to see the King and Crown Prince enter the Sámi Parliament. Students from Troms Fylke (province) also traveled to the event to see the King and learn about Sámi heritage.

In his speech, the King spoke of the reconciliation work that is going on with the Sámi people. He highlighted the importance of feeling proud of one's origins and encouraged all to add to the public conversation.

The Sámi Parliament functions as the central voice for the interests of Sámi people with the Norwegian government and the Storting (national parliament). It was established to help safeguard the traditions, culture and language of Sámi people. Voters of Sámi descent all over Norway cast their ballots for 39 representatives every four years. Silje Karine Muotka, president of the Sámi Parliament, felt very grateful for the King's presence and knows it means a great deal to the entire Sámi population.

Many Norwegians and Norwegian-Americans are of full or partial Sámi descent. The Sámi are an indigenous people with traditional territories within the national borders of Finland, Norway, Sweden and Russia. They have lived in their settlements and moved between areas long before national borders were established. Today, many Sámi have urbanized in varying degrees but large numbers live in the traditional villages and continue to practice long-standing vocations such as reindeer herding.

The Sámi people are addressing the consequences of the "Norwegianization" efforts from the late 17th century until many years after World War II, where Sami culture was seen as primitive and uncivilized and the govern-

ment's goal was to assimilate non-ethnic Norwegians into a more uniform society of language and practices. Laws prohibited using the Sámi language, restricted migratory living on traditional lands and discounted many Sámi beliefs and ways.

In 1997, HRM King Harold officially apologized for these practices

saying, "The state of Norway was founded on the territory of two peoples - the Sámi people and the Norwegians. Sámi history is closely intertwined with Norwegian history. Today, we express our regret on behalf of the state for the injustice committed against the Sámi people through its harsh policy of Norwegianization."

Today, Sámi National Day is celebrated annually on Feb. 6 across Scandinavia and Russia to commemorate the first international Sámi assembly, held in Trondheim, Norway, in 1917. Locally, the Pacific Sámi Searvi organization – similar to Sons of Norway – provides learning workshops, cultural classes and opportunities to appreciate Sámi heritage and traditions.
